Throughout the year I have kept the club/school links going with the help of Rachel Kenyon, School Sports Co-ordinator. I have visited six Junior/Primary Schools and the Faringdon Community College. Unfortunately the Sunday morning tennis sessions have been curtailed since July due to ongoing maintenance works of the tennis courts. Hopefully this will be rectified soon. I have been working quite closely with Chris Hand who is the club coach at Shrivenham Tennis Club. He has managed to gain Faringdon Juniors access to the courts at Shrivenham for a nominal fee of £10 membership over the winter months to make use of the floodlights. This will mean that we will be able to offer a coaching programme throughout the whole year.

Finally I would like to thank all the members for their encouragement and help throughout the year. We are a small club with basic facilities, but we punch above our weight because of the family and friendly atmosphere. Champions, Winners, or players just having fun, I am proud of you all.
